Honor Sovereignty: Most TCUs are chartered by their respective Tribes which hold a long-established special legal relationship with the U.S. federal government. Their relationships were actualized by more than 400 treaties, multiple Supreme Court decisions, Congressional action, and the ceding of more than one billion acres of land. Despite the trust responsibility and treaty obligations, TCUs primary source of operating funds from the federal government has never been fully funded.

Chronic Underfunding: Through the Tribally Controlled Colleges and Universities Assistance Act, most TCUs received \$9,182 per Indian Student or academic year 2023-24 for basic institutional operations. It has taken over 43 years to come within reach of achieving the Congressionally authorized funding level of \$10,907 per Indian Student.

## The nation's 35 accredited Tribal Colleges and Universities:

- Operate 90 campuses and sites in 15 states
- Approx 75% of TCU students receive Pell grants
- TCU students represent well over half of the 574 federally recognized Tribes
- Serve over 160,000 Al/AN students and other rural residents annually through academic and community-based programs

Request TCU Construction and Facilities Improvement: \$3.2 billion (total): A July 2021 AIHEC survey of TCUs revealed many chronic unmet facilities and infrastructure needs, including a lack of student and faculty housing, inadequate classroom space, insufficient libraries, and outdated laboratories.

- TCU deferred maintenance/rehabilitation: \$4000 million (total)
- TCU completion of master plans: \$2.7 billion (total)
- TCU operation and maintenance: \$20 million (annual, recurring need)

AIHEC strongly urges Congress to fund dedicated TCU facilities programs through DOI-BIE to modernize current facilities and build safer 21st-century campuses.
