

Tribal College and University (TCU) Demographic Information:

- 37 TCUs operating more than 75 campuses and sites in the U.S.
- A student/faculty ratio of 8:1.
- Average annual tuition of \$2,800 makes a TCU education the most affordable in the nation.
- Nearly 80 percent of TCU students receive federal financial aid.
- All TCUs offer associate degree programs; 18 offer baccalaureate programs; five offer master's degree programs.
- More than 230 federally recognized tribes are represented at TCUs, including AI/AN students from more than 30 states, including 14 states that do not have their own TCU.
- TCUs are a proven and solid investment: for every \$1 invested in TCUs, the return is at least
 \$5.20 annually, according to an independent study

What is WUE?

The Western Undergraduate Exchange (WUE) is a tuition-savings program that makes attending out-of-state colleges and universities more affordable for students. Through WUE, you receive a reduced tuition rate, giving you more education options for your money. Virtually all undergraduate degrees are available.





How does WUE work?

Participating two- and four-year public colleges and universities across the Western U.S. agree to charge out-of-state students no more than 150 percent of the institution's in-state tuition. Tuition savings may vary depending on the college or major.

The bottom line: You save big with WUE and almost always pay less than out-of-state tuition.

American Indian College Fund (AICF) TCU and Full Circle Scholarships

The **TCU scholarship** is awarded mainly to Native American students, although there is a limited number of scholarships for non-Native American students for the current school

year, here at FDLTCC. The **Full Circle** scholarship is awarded to Native American students during this time-period:

Apply from February 1, 2021 - January 31, 2022 to be considered for awards in the 2021-2022 school year.

Please see the instructions below to get started on one or both scholarships. Contact the financial aid office if you have questions or need help.

Before Applying:

Please type the following four paragraphs in advance and save them as a document on your computer so that you can later copy and paste them into the online application:

- 1. Are you a descendant of a boarding school survivor? If so, you will be asked to write an essay of at least 500 words and explain how it impacted them and your family. Identify which boarding school they attended and what approximate years, if they had a good or bad experience, if they spoke their tribal language before attending boarding school and if they were allowed to speak it there. How did they feel when they came back; did things change and how?
- 2. A list of all honors and other distinctions you have received.
- 3. A list of all extracurricular activities and/or volunteer work in which you have been involved (church, school or community)
- 4. Write a 300-word maximum paragraph for each of these three questions:
 - a. What challenges have you overcome to attend college?
 - b. What are your educational and career goals and how will this scholarship help you achieve them?
 - c. How will your education impact the Native American community?
- 5. Please include a heartfelt thank you to our scholarship donors.

Select a current digital photograph (in jpg format) from your computer files that can be uploaded on to the application. Photos are shared with scholarship donors so a headshot is preferred. Note: the file must be in jpg format.

Obtain a digital copy of a document that verifies that you are an enrolled tribal member. If you are applying as a descendant of a tribal member, obtain digital copies of birth certificates and enrollment information. These documents must be uploaded from your computer files on to the application (combine multiple documents into one document for upload purposes).

Upload your most recent college or high school transcript. Have a digital copy of your transcript ready to upload into the application.

How to Apply:

Go to https://aicfstudents.civicore.com

- 1. Create or edit your profile.
- 2. Copy and paste the appropriate parts of your prepared paragraphs into the profile (honors and awards, activities, thank you).
- 3. When all required fields in your profile are complete, click on "Save" and you will be taken to the applications page where you will see the two Scholarship applications listed.
- 4. **Select "Complete Scholarship Application"** and complete the application. Native American students will be applying for both the TCU and Full-Circle scholarships by completing *one* application. Non-Native students will only be eligible for the TCU scholarship.
- 5. Upon selecting "submit", you will be able to answer the three questions, above. After submitting a final time, you can verify that your application has been sent by receiving an on-screen message thanking you for submitting the application. You will also receive an email from AICF at the address you provided in the application.

NOTES:

- The TCU scholarships are chosen by a local committee which will choose awardees for both Fall and Spring awards by the end of September each year. Students who are not enrolled for Fall will need to complete their application by January 31 to be considered for a Spring scholarship.
- Full Circle scholarships are decided by the American Indian College Fund near the beginning of Fall semester, and are more competitive as they are not awarded in-house. The priority deadline is May 31 each year for the following school year, although you can still apply and be considered for a Full Circle scholarship up until January 31 for your current school year. You should receive an award letter via U.S. postal mail or a denial letter via email from AICF Full Circle.
- NOTE: If you have already received your maximum amount of financial aid for the semester, it may be
 required that we use your award funds to pay down any loans you may have borrowed or adjust other
 financial aid you have received.

INSTRUCTIONS TO APPLICANTS

IMPORTANT: Please read all application materials thoroughly before completing this application. Applications that are incomplete or unsigned will not be reviewed. MUST BE TYPED! NEVER FAX OR EMAIL. ALL SIGNATURES MUST BE ORIGINAL. THE CIB MUST COME DIRECTLY FROM TRIBAL OFFICE. THE FINANCIAL NEEDS ANALYSIS MUST COME DIRECTLY FROM THE COLLEGE.

- 1. GENERAL INFORMATION: CTD's objective is to recognize and reward outstanding student achievement. This supplemental award is intended to help Native American Indian students who are ¼ or more degree American Indian, and an enrolled member of a U.S. tribe. "U.S. Tribe" is defined as federally recognized, state recognized or terminated. All awards are based on merit, academic achievement and ambition. Students must attend a college or university on a full-time basis, seeking a BA or higher. CTD does not fund students studying out of the country or attending non-accredited institutions, vocational, technical institutions, distance learning or online programs. Catching the Dream scholarships are awarded for life. If you win, you will never have to apply again. However, if you are not selected for scholarship with CTD, you cannot apply again.
- 2. **DEADLINES:** It is the applicant's sole responsibility to meet all final deadlines of CTD. Missing material due to failure by others to meet final deadlines will cause your application not to be processed. It is the sole responsibility of the applicant to follow up and ensure that CTD receives valid documents on or before designated deadlines. **NO EXCEPTIONS TO THIS RULE.**

- 3. <u>FUNDING</u>: Because we are a supplemental aid program, applicants are required to apply for <u>all other sources</u> of funding for which they are eligible; this includes applying for campusbased aid. We strongly recommend that applicants look through private scholarship directories for information on over 100,000 scholarships, grants, loan and internships. Go to <u>www.fastweb.com</u> <u>www.scholarship.com</u> and <u>www.salliemae.com</u>. A wide range of corporations, unions, trust funds, religious and fraternal organizations, associations, and private philanthropists can provide you with financial assistance you need to continue your education. Please use our form to list all scholarships you have applied for and fill out completely.
- 4. <u>AWARDS</u>: Scholarships are on a competitive basis. Awards are based on CTD's projected income. Student that are awarded will be notified by letter as early as possible.
- 5. PLEASE TYPE ALL MATERIAL SUBMITTED: Do not staple, bind, or clip any part of the application; leave it loose leaf. Submit all documents on standard size paper (8 ½ x 11). Documents should be placed in the order as specified on page 4 of the application. Do not place labels or dividers in application packet. Use extra pages if necessary. DO NOT LEAVE BLANK SPACES. Failure to supply the requested information may preclude an applicant from being eligible for assistance under this program.
- 6. Proper completion of this application will determine your eligibility for scholarship funding. Students never funded by CTD are considered new students. Continuing students (those who are currently funded by CTD) do not have to reapply. **Instead**, go to our website at www.catchingthedream.org look for Renewal Forms: Follow the instructions they must be completed two weeks after the start of each semester. CTD does not place a limit on the number of terms/semesters for funding. We consider our scholarships "lifetime" awards. Therefore, it is in your best interest to make the time and the utmost effort to complete the application in its entirety.
- **7.** NO! Faxed or E-mail applications or documents will not be accepted. All applications must be mailed and received in our office by the designated deadline in order to be processed.



Junior Science & Humanities Symposium Scholarship Award

The Departments of the U.S. Army, Navy, and Air Force are pleased to award you an undergraduate tuition scholarship in recognition of your outstanding achievement in research.

To claim the scholarship, please complete this form and return it *prior to June 1* in the year the scholarship is <u>awarded</u>, even if you have not yet enrolled in or selected a college. Please note that your scholarship will be held for a maximum of four years from the time of the award; however, you must return this form by June 1 in the year the scholarship is awarded / earned to establish your scholarship account.

Scholarship Administration Policies

- All regional scholarship awards are paid in full in the first year of college enrollment.
- All national scholarship awards are divided into four equal installments to be paid over a four-year period of enrollment.
- All awards may be held and applied to later years upon request, but awards will not be paid in advance (see payment schedule below).
- To maintain eligibility for national scholarships students must
 - o Provide transcripts after each year of college (before July 1)
 - o Maintain a GPA of 3.0 or greater
 - o Declare a major in science, technology, engineering, mathematics, or a related field.
- Total scholarship awards available through JSHS are capped at a maximum total of \$30,000 per individual student winner.

To qualify for this Department of Defense (DoD) sponsored scholarship, you must be

- A U.S. Citizen or Lawful Permanent Resident (LPR) of the United States
- An undergraduate student
- Enrolled full-time at an accredited institution

Scholarship funds may be used to cover tuition and tuition-related materials, such as, but not limited to summer tuition, books, supplies, laboratory fees, and related materials.

Scholarship funds are <u>not</u> authorized for the purchase of a personal computer or software.

JSHS scholarship recipients who attend service academies (West Point, Naval Academy, Air Force Academy) receive full tuition through the U.S. Government, therefore, the JSHS scholarship is not available to support tuition costs. Other legitimate expenses may be supported through the JSHS scholarship. Students who attend service academies should submit a written request to the National Science Teaching Association that details these legitimate expenses.

Please review the payment distribution table below to determine the payment schedule for your award amount. Payment will be issued by the National Science and Teaching Association on or before August 1 beginning in your first year of college enrollment. Payment is made to your college of entry and forwarded to the financial aid office.









The 2023 EPP/MSI Undergraduate Scholarship <u>application</u> is now open — apply today!

The EPP/MSI Undergraduate Scholarship provides funds for two years of undergraduate study to rising junior undergraduate students majoring in Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM) fields that directly support NOAA's mission. Participants conduct research at a NOAA facility during two paid summer internships. Since 2001, 219 students have completed the program and over 75% go on to graduate school.

Students attending Minority Serving Institutions as defined by the US Department of Education (Hispanic Serving Institutions, Historically Black Colleges and Universities, Tribal Colleges and Universities, Alaskan-Native Serving Institutions, and Native Hawaiian Serving Institutions) are eligible to apply for the program.

Important update: Starting in 2019, U.S. nationals are eligible to apply for the EPP/MSI Undergraduate Scholarship Program.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, internships and planned events, such as scholar orientation and the scholar symposium, may be held virtually. The Office of Education will review precautionary guidelines provided by the <u>CDC</u> in advance of events and internships, and will notify scholars when a decision is made whether to hold them virtually or in person.

About the program

- Students receive awards valued at up to \$45,000 in total support (including travel and conference participation) during their junior and senior years.
- Students complete an 11 week paid summer internship and training at NOAA in Silver Spring, MD, between May and July of the first summer. During the second summer, students complete a 10 week paid internships at NOAA facilities across the country. Students are paid a stipend and receive a housing allowance during summer internships.
- Student scholarship recipients attend a two-week orientation at NOAA in Silver Spring, MD, and begin their first summer internship in early June.
- At the end of both summer internships, students present the results of their projects at an Education and Science Symposium in Silver Spring, MD (travel expenses paid).

Eligibility

- Applicants must be U.S. citizens or U.S. nationals.
- Must be currently enrolled as a full-time 2nd year student in a four-year academic program; or transferring from a two-year to a four-year institution; or a 3rd year student in a five-year program.
- Studying a discipline related to NOAA's programs and mission at an accredited minority serving institution (college or university within the United States or U.S. territories).
- Must earn and maintain a minimum 3.2 grade point average on a 4.0 scale.

Explore Microsoft

How cool would it be if you got to explore different roles in software development within your first two years of college? If you aspire to be a software developer and are currently majoring in a technical field—like Computer Science, Electrical Engineering or Computer Engineering—apply for the Explore Microsoft program and find out.

Overview

Explore Microsoft is a 12-week summer internship program specifically designed for first and second year college students. The program is rotational and allows you to gain experience in our different software engineering roles. It's also designed to give you hands-on experience with various tool and programming languages in the field of software development, and encourage you to pursue degrees in computer science, computer engineering, or related technical disciplines. Your on-the-job learning will be augmented with mentoring, community building and networking opportunities.

Qualifications

- Candidates must be in their first or second year of college and enrolled in a
 bachelor's degree program in the United States, Canada, or Mexico with a
 demonstrated interest in majoring in computer science, computer engineering,
 software engineering or related technical major. Students must have completed
 an Introduction to Computer Science course (or equivalent class) as well as one
 semester of calculus (or equivalent) by the start of the program. Finalists will be
 selected based on eligibility and demonstrated interest in the software industry.
- All candidates who meet the above criteria may apply. We especially encourage applications from groups currently underrepresented in engineering, including women, Native-Americans, African-Americans, Hispanics, Veterans and students with disabilities.
- When submitting your resume, be sure it includes your email address, school
 address and phone number, permanent address and phone number, intended
 major and expected graduation date. Please also include a list of your current
 courses within the body of your resume. Only resumes in English are accepted.
